This leaflet covers Nose's Point. The walk at Nose's Point is accessible for most people, it has a firm surface and gentle gradients, and no steps, stiles or barriers. It offers fabulous views of the coast.



This walk connects to the King Charles III England Coast Path. This path is being developed and will soon go all the way around the coast of England. The section in Durham is fully open and provides wonderful views of the cliffs, beaches and coastal wildlife.

This area has changed beyond all recognition. The beach is called 'Blast Beach' after the blast furnaces that dumped waste on to it for years. Today, pause for a while, enjoy the tranquillity and watch the seabirds.

Take care on the coast, follow local signs and keep back from the cliff edge.

Green walk: this is a total of 2.3 miles / 1 hr 10 minutes there and back

Please note: the walk length is approximate. The walk time is based on an average walking speed of 2 miles per hour.

The green walk from Nose's Point is on good, firm paths with very gentle gradients of no more than 6 degrees. There are fabulous views out to sea and plenty of benches to take a rest.

The yellow section of path dips down to a small bridge which is 95cm wide. There is a gradient of up to 14 degrees for 2 metres down to the bridge, and a gradient up to 8 degrees for 10 metres on the other side.

To avoid the bridge, take the path to the right at the waymarker post. The surface on the loop avoiding the bridge is firm but has some loose material on top.

A gateway 2 leads into National Trust land. Beyond the gate the surface changes to a natural compacted surface 3.

At the railway bridge turn around, or follow the King Charles III England Coast Path 4 back. This route has a rougher surface, either gravel or grass.
