Seascapes

<u>Summary</u>

Tyne to Tees, Shores and Seas Partnership Scheme (Seascapes) received funding from the National Heritage Lottery Fund allowing the North East Coastal Project to begin. OASES were tendered to deliver on the educational elements of two of the twenty-three projects; changing coastlines and coast at war.

The educational elements will be delivered by OASES over three years (April 2021 - March 2024). Over the course of this time OASES will deliver educational workshops to KS1 and KS2 pupils from schools across the Seascapes area. Each participating school will be offered 2 workshops, one from the changing coastlines project and one from the coast at war project.

School Recruitment

Year 1

OASES recruited two schools to take part in the project this financial year (21-22). A set up meeting took place with each of the schools to establish class details and workshop choices:

Clavering Primary School - Clavering Sound Mirror Project

Additional work took place in Clavering Primary School to tie in with the Clavering Sound Mirror Project. As part of the SeaScapes project, Tees Archaeology organized and led an archeological dig to find out more about the WW1 sound mirror located in Clavering. The site was just over the road from Clavering Primary School, providing a fantastic opportunity to engage the pupils and wider school community in their local history.

OASES, and local artist Rob Smith, led a workshop with each of the following classes:

Year 5 class — 25 pupils Year 5 class — 24 pupils Year 6 class — 27 pupils Year 6 class — 29 pupils

The pupils learnt about Hartlepool in WW1 and why a sound mirror was built in Clavering, to help provide an early warning system against Zeppelin attacks. The pupils particularly enjoyed estimating and measuring out the length of a Zeppelin in their school grounds which helped them imagine the fear and awe local residents must have felt the first time they saw one.

The pupils then created a Zeppelin shaped listening device, using Scratch programming, to help them think about and tune in to the different sounds in their local area. The pupils really enjoyed taking their listening devices out to the archaeological site and focusing on all the interesting sounds that they could hear.

The pupils then got stuck in and helped the archeologists carry out their dig! They had a fantastic time using archaeology tools and learning from the archeologists. It was lovely to see a tweet from a parent, who had taken their child to visit the Fulwell Sound Mirror after their child had learnt about the Clavering Sound Mirror during the workshops:

<u>Year 3</u>

Along with Rob Smith, the sound artist, we have created a Sound Mirror education pack to continue the legacy of the Clavering Sound Mirror Project. It will be shared with Clavering Primary Schools, and other schools in the Hartlepool area.

We trialed some activities from the education pack through a sound walk with two Year 5 classes from Clavering Primary School in April and May 2023.

These pupils had taken part in the SeaScapes session and archaeological dig in October, so these activities built upon their prior knowledge.

We also facilitated a discussion between the school and Rob Smith, to allow Rob Smith to install a sound level monitor in the school grounds. This fed into his sound mirror artwork: <u>https://soundmirror.xyz/</u>
